 - How did the serpent change God's words in 2:16,17? 3:1b What was he implying about God's
 generosity, provisions? How is this attack on God's Word related to everything that has gone on before?

FYI: "hath God said. The root of all sin is doubting God's Word...Satan merely implanted a slight doubt concerning God's veracity and His sovereign goodness. The approach so successful in this case has provided the pattern for his temptations ever since."

If this fruit is something good for her, why doesn't God want her to have it?. Satan wants us to see sin as something good that a bad God doesn't want us to have. His main lie to us is 'sin is not bad, and God is not good.' Satan and the flesh will present a thousand reasons to show how good it would be to disobey His command.' (Barnhouse)"

- 13. After eating the fruit, what was the first thing Eve did? 3:6b Why do you think she did this? Do you think Adam was directly "with her" and witnessed the temptation?
 - Why do you think Adam ate the fruit? Who was deceived and who wasn't? (See 1 Timothy 2:14; Romans 5:17)

FYI: "As Kenneth Matthews points out; 'The woman listens to the serpent, the man listens to the woman, and no one listens to God.""

FYI: "The manifestation of death was emotional, spiritual, relational, environmental, and ultimately physical...When they heard God approaching 'they hid from the Lord God' (3:8) The spiritual relationship that nourished them and should have brought them their greatest joy and become a terror to them." - The Tony Evans Study Bible (5,6)

- 15. Although Adam and Eve didn't immediately die *physically*, what kind of *death* occurred? What happened to all mankind? Ephesians 2:1; Romans 5:12
- 16. Since God is all-knowing, why do you think He asked them where they were? 3:9 What tone do you hear in God's question as he was seeking them?

FYI: "God sought – they hid- and God found...The initial question was not an indictment...There was no hint of accusation, God nudged Adam to come to his senses. The process was graced."

FYI: "Adam...accused God...In doing this Adam was like Satan, who had argued that a better God would not withhold anything from His people. Here Adam implied that a better God would not have given him Eve. Implicit blasphemy."

- 21. Underline ways to deal with temptation.
 - Psalm 119:11 I have hidden your word in my heart that I might not sin against you. NIV
 - Hebrews 4:16 Let us then approach the throne of grace with confidence, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need. NIV
 - Matthew 26:41 "Watch and pray so that you will not fall into temptation. The spirit is willing, but the body is weak." NIV
 - Galatians 5:16 So I say, live by the Spirit, and you will not gratify the desires of the sinful nature. NIV
 - 2 Timothy 2:22 Flee the evil desires of youth, and pursue righteousness, faith, love and peace, along with those who call on the Lord out of a pure heart. NIV

Day 3

22. What curse did the Lord pronounce on Satan? 3:14 (Compare the use of the phrase "eating dust" in Micah 7:17.)

• What is implied about a curse on other animals in 3:14? What does that say about any fossil record containing dead animals prior to this time?

FYI: "All of animate creation would be banished from the fertility and harmony of the garden, but the serpent was cursed 'above all' the rest of the animals. His exile was permanent and inviolable – eternal...Eating dust variously signifies abject humiliation in Scripture. (Psalm 72:9)."

"The emphasis lies in the snake's 'eating dust,' an expression that elsewhere carries the meaning of 'total defeat' (cf. Isaiah 65:25; Micah 7:17)."

23. What kind of blow would be dealt to Satan and by whom? 3:15 (See John 12:31; 16:11; Rev. 20:2,10)

What kind of blow would be inflicted on the "seed" of the woman? 3:15b (Who is the seed?
 Galatians 3:16, 4:4) What does the difference between a blow to the head versus heel indicate?

FYI: Bruise thy head "This prophecy was fulfilled in the first instance at the cross, but will culminate when the triumphant Christ casts Satan into the lake of fire (Revelation 20:10)." - The Defender's Study Bible

Early church writers referred to 3:15 as the *proevangelium* or "first gospel."

24. How were the blessings of child bearing and marriage affected by the Fall? 3:16

FYI: "In the beginning, when the man and the woman were created, childbirth was at the center of the blessing that their Creator had bestowed on them (1:28). Now, after the Fall, childbirth is again to be the means through which the snake would be defeated and the blessing restored. In the pain of the birth of every child, there was to be a reminder of the hope that lay in God's promise. Birth pangs are not merely a reminder of the futility of the Fall; they are as well a sign of an impending joy."

"Paradise was lost. Yet there was grace. God's curse upon Satan meant that His own Son would one day become a curse for us...God's judgments would fall on the very center of the women's existence. But in those judgments there was grace. Nothing would satisfy her but God."

FYI: "Because you have heeded the voice of your wife: It wasn't just as if Adam took Eve's advice. He chose to be with Eve instead of obeying God. There is a sense in which *idolatry of Eve* was an aspect of Adam's disobedience against God."

FYI: Thorns Strong's OT:6975 qos, " a thorn, a thornbush...It refers to an undesirable, inedible shrub that became part of God's curse on the ground...The word is used in similes to designate an undesirable thing (2 Sam. 23:6) and to represent enemies of the psalmist in some passages (Ps. 18:12). - The Complete Word Study Dictionary O.T.

- The Companion Bible "The word may include all kinds of noxious insects, &c., as well as poisonous weeds."

27. What phrases describe the state of creation in Romans 8:20,21,22? What end result will God bring about? 8:21 (See also 2 Peter 3:13; Revelation 22:1-5)



28. List the phrases that describe the consequences that Adam would bear regarding his work on earth, 3:17.18.19a What does this say about the "rule" over the earth that they lost? Ironically. how does the blessing and then the curse of the ground give a picture of Adam's submission and then rebellion to God?

Food for Thought: "[God] did not create death in the direct sense, but rather withdrew that extension of His power which had maintained a 'steady state' of life and order, thus allowing all things gradually to disintegrate toward disorder and death...Thus the entire creation was made 'subject to vanity.' (Romans 8:20) The earth began to 'wear out as a garment' and ultimately 'shall perish.' (Hebrews 1:10-12)

Instead of all things being 'made' - that is, organized into complex systems - as they were in Creation Week, they are now being 'unmade,' becoming disorganized and simple. Instead of life and growth, there comes decay and death; instead of evolution, there is degeneration.

This, then, is the true origin of the strange law of disorder and decay, the universally applicable, all-important Second Law of Thermodynamics...Man is a sinner and has brought God's curse on the earth." - Henry Morris

"In an instant the original couple passed from life to death, from sinlessness to sin, from harmony to alienation, from trust to distrust, from ease to dis-ease. It did not take a day. It happened in a millisecond!" - R. Kent Hughes (76)

29. What other consequence would Adam and Eve ultimately experience? 3:19b (Cross-ref. 2:17) How drastically would you say the world changed from the "very good" world of Genesis 1 and 2?

FYI: 3:19 dust thou art. "The Curse thus applies to man and woman, to the animals and to the physical elements, God's whole creation. ... There could have been no death in the world before man brought sin into the world. Thus, the fossils in the earth's crust cannot be a record of the evolution of life leading up to man but must be a record of death after man. In the evolutionary scenario, struggle and death in the animal kingdom eventually, after a billion years, brought man into the world. The truth is, however, that man brought death into his whole dominion by his sin." - The Defender's Study Bible

"With sin came the Second Law of Thermodynamics. From that time on, entropy, or disorder, would be constantly increasing. Everything in the universe after that time would be decaying, running down, rusting, wearing out without exception. Isaiah 51:6 describes what we fully understand, '... the earth will wear out like a garment and its inhabitants die like flies." - Jim Winebrener

"The concept of evolution...is exactly the opposite of the universally proved scientific principle of increasing entropy [disorder] . This theory is nevertheless believed to be the most fundamental principle of nature by almost the entire intellectual establishment!" - The Defender's Study Bible

"There is death in the world only because there is sin in the world. It is this great truth that causes evolutionists to stumble over God and His word...they simply cannot tolerate the record of man's Fall and God's Curse as the cause of suffering and death in the world...

A prominent anti-Christian philosopher, Michael Ruse, sees the problem better than most Christians. 'Either humankind is in a state of original sin or it is not. As a result, the whole Biblical system of salvation collapses...Evolution thus becomes the most potent weapon for destroying the Christian faith." (Mattill, A.
